- How often training should be undertaken
- Whether practical training should be undertaken
- Whether general use adrenaline injectors are required and if so, how many
- Food allergen management training

Project aims:


- To develop best practice guidelines for anaphylaxis prevention and management in schools and CEC

- To encourage the implementation of the best practice guidelines in all schools and CEC services


Consultation process

- Phase 1 Engagement with key school and CEC stakeholders, both government and non-government
- Phase 2 Engagement with schools and CEC staff and parents/care givers via national online surveys
- Phase 3 Final key schools and CEC stakeholder engagement

Outcomes

- · Best practice guidelines for the prevention and management of anaphylaxis developed – separate school and childcare
- Support resources developed to support implementation of the best practice guidelines at the individual school and
