22.93M Total My Health Records

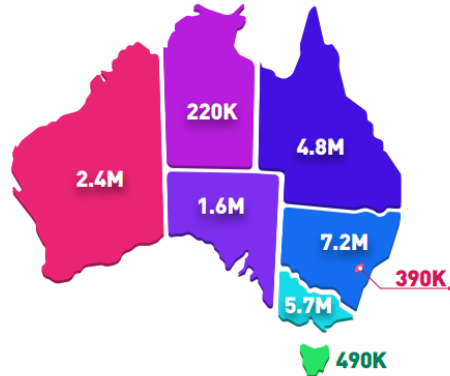
When you have a My Health Record your health information can be viewed securely online from anywhere, at any time – even if you move or travel interstate. You and your healthcare providers can also access your health information from any computer or device that's connected to the internet.

An increase of 120,000 records since July 2020 and 20,000 in the last month.



89% of all records now have data in them

What's inside?

2.74B Documents uploaded to My Health Record

From medical histories to the latest blood tests, from pathology reports to advanced care plans, more vital health information is now securely stored and available when needed.

There are more than 350M documents in the system that have been uploaded by consumers or healthcare providers.

+ 129M Clinical Documents

Documents uploaded by a healthcare provider like hospitals, pathologists and radiologists.

An increase of more than 6 million documents in March

+ 223M Medicine Documents

Documents uploaded by healthcare providers like pharmacies and GPs.

An increase of more than 9 million documents in March

+ 2.4B Medicare Documents

Documents uploaded by government agencies like Services Australia and Veterans' Affairs.

+ 358K Consumer Documents

Documents uploaded by people



Key Insight

There have been 67,000 people who have registered for a My Health Record that had previously opted out and another 11,000 registered that had previously cancelled their record.

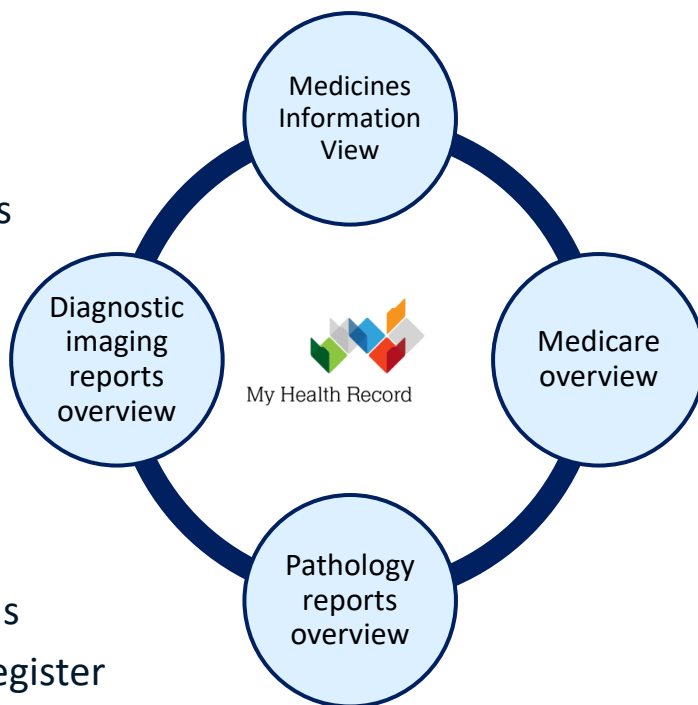

- via a personal health summary
- This can include de-labelling information.
- Remember to include:
 - ‘confirmed NOT allergic’
 - date of challenge test
 - name of specialist

Patient control of their My Health Record



A patient can choose to restrict access to specific documents in their My Health Record by setting a Limited Document Access Code (LDAC).

Only organisations approved in the LDAC can access those documents



A patient can restrict access to their entire record using a Record Access Code (RAC).

In a consultation, the patient will need to give you the code to allow access to their record.



In an emergency, a clinician can exercise a 'break glass' facility to allow temporary access



Patients can choose to receive an SMS or email alert when a health provider organisation accesses their My Health Record



All instances of access to My Health Record are monitored and logged
